BOARD OF TRUSTEES

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On June 24, 1946, The Cleveland Law School and The John Marshall School of Law became affiliated under the name of the Cleveland-Marshall Law School. The Cleveland Law School was founded in 1897 and the John Marshall School of Law was established in 1916.

The Cleveland-Marshall Law School is operated not for profit and is designed to meet the requirements of students who seek a legal education by attending evening classes.

The School is a member of the League of Ohio Law Schools and is approved by the Veterans Administration to give instruction under the G.I. Bill of Rights.

The members of the Faculty are either Judges or Lawyers who have had extended teaching experience.

The Case method of instruction used in most day schools has been adapted in the main so as to serve the best interests of serious-minded students.

An excellent law library is maintained for use of students at all times.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

Regular Students. Applicants for admission as regular students, candidates for a degree, must present credentials showing satisfactory completion of at least two years study (60 semester hours or 90 quarter hours) at an approved college and will be required to register with the Supreme Court of Ohio when they begin the study of law.

Advanced Standing. Students in good standing from Law Schools approved by the American Bar Association or the League of Ohio Law Schools, may be admitted to advanced standing upon submitting credentials showing that they have satisfactorily pursued a course of legal study equivalent to that required in this school for the period preceding the date when such students are admitted. At least one full year of work will be required in residence at the Cleveland-Marshall Law School to qualify such student for a degree. No credit will be given for instruction received by private tuition or by correspondence.

Special Students. A limited number of applicants may be admitted as special students upon presenting satisfactory evidence of sufficient education to enable them to pursue legal study to their advantage. Such students will be subject to the same rules and regulations as regular students and to the same charges. A special student who completes the full course will be entitled to a Certificate of Law Study. The Bachelor of Law degree will

be conferred only on those special students who display unusual scholastic ability.

Early registration is advisable and all students are required to register in person. The office is open for consultation and registration during the summer months from 10:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., and beginning August 19th, from 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M., or later by appointment. A personal interview prior to registration is invited. Telephone MAin 2533.

ATTENDANCE, EXAMINATIONS, GRADES, AND DISMISSAL OF STUDENTS

Students are required to attend classes with substantial regularity. Attendance upon less than 80% of the total sessions of any course will be deemed cause for withholding credit for that course, except by special permission of the instructor in charge. Written examinations in all subjects are conducted at the close of each course.

Although 65% is the passing grade, a student must attain an average of 75% in all subjects taken during the year to remain in good standing. A grade of 60-64 is a condition and must be removed by further study and re-examination. A grade below 60 is a failure and the course must be repeated for credit.

Any student who fails to attain a yearly average of 75% will be automatically dropped from the rolls and will not be reinstated except by special action of the Faculty.

Tuition is payable quarterly, in advance, in accordance with the following schedule:

First Quarter—On or before close of registration.

Second Quarter—On or before December 15, 1946.

Third Quarter—On or before February 15, 1947.

Fourth Quarter—On or before May 15, 1947.

Written notice of withdrawal must be given to the Registrar. Tuition will be pro-rated only as of the date of such notice. Fees are not refundable.

Note: Students taking less than a full years program will be charged at the rate of 80 cents per hour.

Students who are in arrears will not be permitted to attend classes or take examinations.

Monthly payments may be arranged without additional cost.
