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# **TROUSERS** STAIN SEEN AS BLOOD

**Husband Hopes to Attend** Funeral Today; Gerber and Family Closeted

BULLETIN Two pairs of gloves-one with red stains-were found under the platform of the Sheppard beach house, it was learned early today.

Police Chief John P. Ea-ton said they would be turned over to Coroner Samuel R. Gerber.

The discovery was reported soon after Dr. Stephen A. Sheppard finished a three-hour interview with Deputy Sheriff Carl A. Rossbach.

BY JOHN G. BLAIR Questioning of Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard, husband of the Bay Village hack-murder victim, Mrs. Marilyn R. Sheppard, late yesterday was postponed until at least after her funeral this after-

noon. Dr. Samuel R. Gerber, Cuyahoga County coroner, was closeted for two hours at the Bay Village City Hall with the father and a brother of the injured husband but did not receive permission to talk to Dr. Shappard

Dr. Richard A. Sheppard, father of Dr. Sheppard, said his son was not in condition to undergo questioning.

Condition Is Factor Nevertheless, he added, it was hoped Dr. Sheppard would be able to attend private funeral services for his wife this after-

noon.

Dr. Gerber said last night that he probably would not question Dr. Sheppard until tomorrow.

ne probably would not question Dr. Sheppard until tomorrow. However, Deputy Sheriff Carl A. Ross bach said he would make an attempt later today, if possible. Dr. Stephen A. Sheppard, a brother, who has been in charge of treatment for the injured neurosurgeon, said he would determine what his brother's condition was after the funeral after the dition was funeral

## Gerber to Quiz Bay Doctor After Wife's Funeral Today

Permission was also given by the family to question the 6½-year-old son of the couple, Samuel R., known as "Chip." The family said he could be questioned after the funeral.

Nature of Dr. Sheppard's injuries, which he said were inflicted by an intruder who beat him after chopping his wife to death Sunday morning, was further revealed by Dr. Charles W. Elkins.

Dr. Elkins, assistant professor of neuro-surgery at Western Reserve University school of medicine, said that Dr. Sheppard suffered from a concussion of the spine and that there was a numbness in his left upper extremity. tremity. The

The medical expert made a lumbar tap yesterday morning at the hospital. The test was made at the Lutheran Hospital laboratory.

Tests were to be made to de-termine the nature of "a small piece of inorganic material" piece of inorganic mate found on the bedroom floo the Sheppard house. The floor of terial, resembling a chip of paint, according to Dr. Gerber, was according to Dr. Gerber, was found near the foot of the bed on which Mrs. Sheppard's battered body was discovered Shirt Still Missing

Dr. Gerber said it was possible it had come from the murder

weapon, yet undiscovered.

Also still missing was the T-shirt worn by Dr. Sheppard earlier in the evening but missing when he was found on the living room floor in a deard condition. room floor in a dazed condition.

Dr. Gerber said stains on trousers worn by Dr. Sheppard "had all the appearances of being blood."

## Gives More Details

He showed it to Dr. Richard N. Sheppard and in it they found \$100 in \$10's and \$20's. The chief said that Dr. Samuel Sheppard had told his family about it and that it had been untouched. untouched.

## **Explains Complications**

Dr. Stephen Sheppard said it would be impossible for his

brother to self-inflict his injuries.
Complications in the patient's condition have developed since Sunday, when Dr. Sheppard was taken to the hospital after his wife had been found, her head and face chopped 25 times by some sharp instrument.

Certain abdominal reflexes and functions have stroyed or failed, Dr. Sheppard reported.

He said spinal damage was to the second cervical vertebra just

The injured doctor had been choked, punched and received heavy blows on the right side of the head and the back of the neck, Dr. Sheppard said.
