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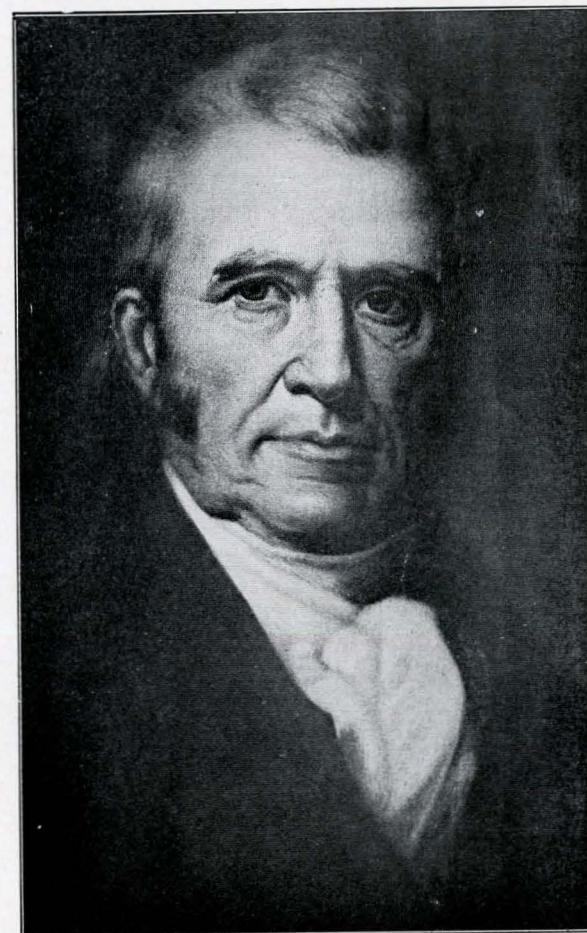

HISTORY

In 1916 a number of prominent attorneys of Cleveland, desirous of raising the general standard of legal attainment, and feeling the need in the community of a school of law that should be rigidly thorough and at the same time entirely practical in its teaching, formed an association to realize their ideals.

The founders' plans were of an unusually broad and liberal character and anticipated in surprising degree the wide and distinctive service now rendered by the institution which they founded and which carries the name of the nation's greatest juristic genius, John Marshall. The new institution opened its doors on September 20, 1916, and so immediate was the response it received and so eminently successful were the results of its first year's instruction, that at the close of the year in May, 1917, it became affiliated with Ohio Northern University.

After six years of the most cordial relations with the university, it was deemed advisable to secure a charter from the state of Ohio, authorizing The John Marshall School of Law to confer degrees in its own name. Such a charter was secured in January, 1924. This charter puts The John Marshall School of Law on a par with the best law schools in the state and insures freedom to respond to the advance in ideas of legal education.

PURPOSE

The John Marshall School of Law is distinctly a lawyer's school. Its faculty is composed of successful attorneys in active practice, who are also experienced in teaching. Every effort is made to admit as candidates for a degree only such students as give promise by their education, attainments and character of becoming honorable and worthy practitioners of the law.

The most noteworthy feature in the progress of legal education in the United States, has been the development of efficient law schools. "Reading law" in a lawyer's office is of unquestionable value because of the familiarity it gives with the routine work and everyday practice of the profession, but in training a lawyer, it can never take the place of the thorough, systematic instruction given by a good law school. The course of study covered by The John Marshall School of Law embraces the entire field of law and is designed to develop the student, and to fit him for the active duties of a practicing lawyer.

The instruction is founded upon the conviction that the law is a science and is designed to teach the principles of law, their history and reason and to develop the powers of analysis, discrimination and judgment essential to the practical application of these principles.

LOCATION

The John Marshall School of Law for the first three years was located in the Guardian Building, where it occupied comfortable quarters which were ample during the school's infancy.

The rapidly increasing attendance soon called for more commodious quarters. The school is now located at 242-248 Superior Avenue, opposite the Post Office, where it occupies approximately 4,000 feet of floor space—ample room for the present and immediate future.

The location is unsurpassed. It is only a step to the Municipal Court, the Court of Common Pleas, the Court of Appeals, and the United States District Court. The student is only a few minutes from the leading law firms of the city.

LIBRARY FACILITIES

The John Marshall School of Law has an excellent law library. Here the student has access to the Ohio State Reports and Digests, Ohio Court of Appeals Reports, the United States Reports and Digests, Cyc., Corpus Juris, the Ohio Statutes, law dictionaries and a stack of supplemental text books for reference. Students may also arrange to use the Cuyahoga County Law Library in the New Court House, one of the largest and finest collections of Law literature in America.

The student also has access to the public library, where he will find a fine collection of current literature. Adequate library facilities are a prime essential to the student of Law.

OPPORTUNITY FOR LEGAL STUDY

No city in the country affords better facilities for legal study than Cleveland. Here sit the District Court of the United States; the Appellate Court of Ohio; the Common Pleas Courts; the Probate Court of Cuyahoga County; the Cleveland Municipal Courts, and the Admiralty and Insolvency Courts. Cleveland affords an opportunity to follow the progress of a case from the lowest to the highest court, with few exceptions.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION AND CLASSIFICATION OF STUDENTS

Students may enter the School at any time, but in order to receive full credit toward graduation for work done must enter at the beginning of a semester.

Candidates for admission to the bar and for a degree will be required, upon their application for admission, to furnish satisfactory evidence of the completion of two years of college work. Such are known as Regular Students.

Students not candidates for admission to the bar and for a degree may enter upon proving to the satisfaction of the Dean that they possess such general education as will enable them to pursue the study of law intelligently. Such are known as Special Students.

Candidates for admission to the Ohio bar will be required to conform to the provisions of Rule XIV, as amended June 10, 1927, and promulgated by the Ohio Supreme Court, viz.:

RULE XIV ADMISSION TO THE OHIO BAR

(As Amended June 10, 1927)

SECTION 1. Except as provided in Section 1703 General Code, concerning persons who have been admitted and practiced in the highest court of another state, or in the Supreme Court of the United States, for a period of five years, no person shall be admitted to the bar except upon an examination and certificate of the Standing Committee on Examinations.

SECTION 2. There shall be appointed, to take effect on the first day of January, 1901, ten discreet and judicious attorneys and counselors-at-law to be known as the Standing Committee on Examinations. Two members of the committee shall be appointed for one year, two for two years, two for three years, two for four years, and two for five years. Their successors shall be appointed for a term of five years each.

Section 3. The Standing Committee shall hold examinations of applicants for admission to the Bar in the City of Columbus, Ohio, on the first Thursday and Friday after the first Tuesday in January and on the last Tuesday and Wednesday of June. No other examinations will be held. Examinations must be conducted under the direction of the Committee.

Each examiner shall grade the papers of the applicants in the subjects in which he has submitted questions and forward his report to the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, who shall cause the grades to be tabulated.

SECTION 3a. No applicant shall be admitted unless he has sustained on his written answers to the questions of the examiners an average grade of 75 per cent on an examination embracing the following subjects:—

The law of real and personal property, torts, contracts, evidence, pleading, partnership, bailments, negotiable instruments, agency, suretyship, domestic relations, wills, corporations, equity, criminal law, constitutional law, and the canons of professional ethics adopted by the Ohio State Bar Association, at its 30th annual meeting, 1909.

SECTION 3b. None but citizens of the United States will be admitted to the examination and every applicant must be twenty-one years of age. The printed interrogatories and the answers of applicants thereto shall be submitted to the Court, and, together with all certificates and papers required under this rule, shall be filed with the Clerk and preserved. (As amended Nov. 17, 1925.)

SECTION 4. REQUIREMENTS AS TO GENERAL LEARNING. Each applicant for registration as a law student must present a certificate of general learning with his certificate that he has begun the study of law. Such certificate of general learning shall meet the following requirements:

- A. If filed between the 15th day of October, 1926, and the 15th day of October, 1927, it shall show that the applicant has successfully completed one year of study in an approved college, to be evidenced by the signature of the proper official thereof; or other educational equivalent to be determined in the manner provided by Paragraph "H" hereof.
- B. On and after October 15, 1927, it shall show that the applicant has successfully completed two years of study in an approved college, to be evidenced by the signature of the proper official thereof; or other educational equivalent to be determined in the manner provided by Paragraph "H" hereof.
- C. It shall further show—
 - (1) That the requirements for admission to the college issuing the same are at least 15 units of high school credits and that the applicant satisfied said requirements.
 - (2) The period of the applicant's attendance.
 - (3) The number of college credits received, which shall be not less than 30 semester hours, or 45 quarter hours, for each year of study in an approved college.
- D. Applicants who register or apply for examination under the provisions of sections 7 and 8 of this rule shall be required to file certificates of general learning as provided in paragraphs "A", "B" and "C" hereof, at the time of such registration or application.
- E. All credentials presented under this rule must be submitted to the Court and if the Court is satisfied that the applicant has the educational qualifications required he will be admitted to registration. All credentials presented shall be filed with the Clerk.
- F. The Clerk of this Court is authorized to accept certificates which clearly meet the requirements of this section.
- G. Diplomas should not be presented. Certificates which may be retained permanently are desired. They should be upon the official stationery of the college or university in which the applicant carried on the study required.
- H. Questions as to whether a particular college is an approved college within the meaning of this section, and questions as to the value to be given to credits presented from a college not approved, and questions relating to the sufficiency of the credits presented by an applicant, shall be referred to an examiner appointed by this Court, and his determination of such questions shall be final and shall be reported to this Court for record.
- I. Members of the Ohio Association of Colleges are "approved colleges."
- J. Certificates of general learning meeting the requirements of Section 4 as the same existed immediately prior to the adoption of this amendment will be accepted for registration until October 15, 1926.
- K. Applicants who registered prior to June 7, 1923, who have not yet filed certificates of general learning may qualify in that respect by filing a certificate meeting the requirements of Section 4, as the same existed immediately prior to the adoption of this amendment. (As amended January 14, 1926.)

SECTION 5. The Court will not receive applications for waiver of the requirements mentioned in Section 4.

SECTION 6. Every resident of the state who commences the study of law on and after June 7, 1923, either under the tuition of an attorney-at-law, or at a law school, whether located in this state or elsewhere, shall file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court his declaration of intention to commence the study of law preparatory to examination for admission to the bar together with the certificate of such attorney or of the chief officer of such law school, as the case may be, showing his name, age and residence, and the date when he commenced the study of law, which certificate shall be accompanied by a fee of one dollar. As to all such persons the period required for the study of law by the rules of this Court shall date from the filing of such declaration and certificate.

Before any such certificate and declaration shall be filed such person shall present to the Clerk of this Court satisfactory evidence of general educational attainments as required by section 4 of this rule. (As amended May 22, 1923.)

SECTION 7. Every person who shall commence the study of law while a non-resident of this state, and who has not been regularly admitted as an attorney-at-law in some court of record within the United States, shall, on coming into this state to reside, file with the Clerk an affidavit showing that he has come into the state for the purpose of making it his permanent residence, and stating his name, age, present and former residence, and also the certificate of his preceptor, or of the chief officer of his law school, showing the time when, and place or places where, and under whom, he has studied law; which papers shall be accompanied by a fee of one dollar and certificate of general learning as required by Section 4 of this rule.

The one year's residence in this state required of such persons by section 1701 General Code shall date from the filing of such papers. (As amended Feb. 25, 1925.)

SECTION 8. Every person entitled to be admitted to the examination under Section 1702, General Code, on the ground that he has been regularly admitted as an attorney and counselor at law in some court of record within the United States, shall, not less than ninety days before the time fixed for the examination, file with the Clerk the following credentials:

1. An affidavit showing that he is a resident of this state or that he has come into the state for the purpose of making it his permanent residence, and stating his name, age and former and present residence.
2. His certificate of admission to the bar.
3. The certificate of a judge of the court of record in which he has practiced law, showing the time such judge has personally known him, the period of time he has practiced law and his moral and professional standing at such bar.
4. Certificate of his preceptor or the law school which he attended showing the period of his study of law. (If the judge's certificate mentioned in No. 3 shows practice for three years or more this certificate is not required.)
5. Certificate of general learning as required by Section four of this rule.

SECTION 9. Repealed May 22nd, 1923.

SECTION 10. Except as provided in Section 8, concerning persons who have been admitted to the bar in some Court of record within the United States, every person who desires to have his name enrolled for examination must not less than ninety days before the time fixed for the examination,

file with the Clerk his application, giving his name, age, residence and post-office address, and with such application he shall present a certificate: (1) from a law school where instruction is given during the day time and in which the entire time of the student is devoted to study of legal subjects, whose standing is approved by the Court, certifying that the applicant has regularly and attentively studied in said law school for the period of three school years, or (2) from a law school where the entire time of the student is not devoted to the study of legal subjects, whose standing is approved by the Court, certifying that the applicant has regularly and attentively studied in said law school for the period of four school years, or (3) if the applicant has studied law under the tutorage of an attorney in active practice as the preceptor and instructor of such applicant for a period of four calendar years, and not less than two hundred hours per year of actual legal instruction, the facts with relation to such instruction and practice shall be set forth in such certificate and duly verified by the affidavit of such attorney, showing that during such period he has given actual instruction for the required number of hours in the subjects enumerated in Section 3a of this rule.*

Provided, that students heretofore registered will be required to show compliance with this rule covering the period from and after January 15th, 1924; and in no case will the certificate of another attorney or counselor at law be received unless it be shown by the affidavit of the applicant that his preceptor is dead or that his certificate cannot for some reason satisfactory to the Court, be obtained, but in such case the certificate must show that the certifier has personal knowledge of the length of time the applicant has been engaged in the study of law; also that the said certificate shall show the name and postoffice address of the applicant's preceptor. Each applicant for admission to such examination shall be required to state in an affidavit filed by him on his application for admission to such examination, that he is a citizen of the United States and that he has resided in the State of Ohio for the year last past, and that he has read the Canons of Professional Ethics, adopted by the Ohio State Bar Association July 7, 1909, and has faithfully endeavored to make himself acquainted with the same, and that he will endeavor to conform his professional conduct thereto. (As amended Jan. 15, 1924, and Feb. 25, 1925.)†

SECTION 11. No certificate, affidavit or other paper produced in conformity with this rule shall be deemed conclusive evidence of the facts therein stated, and in all cases the court must be satisfied of the truth thereof before the applicant shall be admitted to examination.

SECTION 12. Each application for admission to an examination must be accompanied by an examination fee of \$15.00, which will be returned to the applicant if his name is not placed on the examination roll. If his name is placed on the examination roll, and he fails to receive a certificate of qualification, an additional examination fee of \$10.00 must accompany each subsequent application. If the applicant, on examination, shall be rejected, he may be admitted to the next examination upon filing a certificate from a law school or an attorney, as required by Section 10 of this rule, that he has studied law for the period of six months subsequent to the date of his former examination; but no one shall be admitted to more than five examinations. (As amended Jan. 20, 1925.)

*The Court has ruled that no additional credit will be allowed to law school students for law study under attorneys between law school terms; nor is any additional credit allowed to such students for part time study in law offices during school terms.

†NOTE:—Any student may obtain a copy of the American Bar Association publication containing above named Canons of Professional Ethics by application to the Clerk of the Supreme Court. Blank application for admission to the examination should also be obtained from the clerk.

SECTION 13. After the expiration of the thirtieth day before the examination the court will examine the papers filed by the applicant, and cause him to be notified whether he will be admitted to the examination unconditionally, or subject to the production of a supplemental certificate of additional study, when that may be necessary, and if so admitted, will cause his name to be placed on the examination roll which will be delivered to the Standing Committee.

SECTION 14. The Standing Committee may, subject to the approval of the court, make rules not inconsistent herewith, for the conduct of the examinations, which, together with this rule, shall be published in pamphlet form for distribution by the Standing Committee.

SECTION 15. The applicant, upon receiving the oath of office, shall sign a roll showing the date of his admission and the place of his residence. The oath administered shall be as follows:

I DO SOLEMNLY SWEAR:

I will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Ohio;

I will maintain the respect due to courts of justice and judicial officers;

I will not counsel or maintain any suit or proceeding which shall appear to me to be unjust, nor any defense except such as I believe to be honestly debatable under the law of the land;

I will employ for the purpose of maintaining the causes confided to me such means only as are consistent with truth and honor, and will never seek to mislead the judge or jury by any artifice or false statement of fact or law;

I will maintain the confidence and preserve inviolate the secrets of my client, and will accept no compensation in connection with his business except from him or with his knowledge and approval;

I will abstain from all offensive personality, and advance no fact prejudicial to the honor or reputation of a party or witness, unless required by the justice of the cause with which I am charged;

I will never reject, from any consideration personal to myself, the cause of the defenseless or oppressed, or delay any man's cause for lucre or malice. SO HELP ME GOD.

SECTION 16. Refers to keeping records, etc.

SECTION 17. The following form must be used for the certificate by a preceptor, mentioned in Section 10-12, of this rule.
TO THE SUPREME COURT OF OHIO:

I HEREBY CERTIFY, That I am an attorney engaged in active practice of law, and that I have acted as the preceptor and instructor of an applicant for admission to the bar examination for the period of calendar years, and months, from 19.... to 19..... I further certify that said applicant is a citizen of the United States and of the State of Ohio; that he has resided in said state for one year last past; that he is over 21 years of age, of good moral character; that he has regularly and attentively studied law under my tutorage for the entire period of time above named and that during said period I gave to said applicant not less than two hundred hours per year of actual legal instruction; I further certify that said applicant has satisfactorily completed a course of study in all the subjects enumerated in Section 3a of Rule XIV; that I believe him to be a person of sufficient legal knowledge and ability to discharge the duties of an Attorney and Counselor-at-law, and would therefore recommend his admission to the bar.

Note—Blank forms for certificate and application should be obtained from the Clerk. The above section as amended, was adopted Jan. 15, 1924, and such certificate must be used for certifying any law study after that date.

SECTION 18. Repealed.

SECTION 19. Certificates of study given by schools known as correspondence law schools, or by lawyers without the state, certifying that the applicant has studied under their supervision within the state of Ohio, do not satisfy the Ohio statute and the rules respecting study ordered by the Supreme Court of Ohio, and such certificates will not be filed or in any way recognized.

ADMISSION WITHOUT EXAMINATION

SECTION 20. An applicant for admission to the bar of Ohio without examination, under Section 1703, General Code, must file with the Clerk the following credentials:

1. Certificate of admission as an attorney and counselor-at-law in the highest court of another state after two year's study of the law, and upon a regular examination, which study and examination must be shown either by a certificate of the facts or by a requirement thereof in the statute of such state.

2. Certificate from the Judge of the Court of Record in which the applicant practiced, that he is of good moral character and that he has been an active practitioner in good and regular standing, in the courts of such state or in the Supreme Court of the United States for a period of not less than five years immediately preceding his removal to the State of Ohio. This certificate must be authenticated by the Clerk of Courts under seal.

3. Certificate of good moral character, and recommendation from some attorney-at-law of this state, that the applicant be admitted to the bar of Ohio.

4. The affidavit of the applicant that he is a resident of this state, or has come into the state for the purpose of making it his permanent residence.

A fee of \$16.00 must accompany the application.

RULE RELATING TO FOREIGN ATTORNEYS

SECTION 21. Attorneys-at-law residing without the state of Ohio, not members of the bar of this state, who have been retained in any case assigned for oral argument, may be heard therein upon being presented to the Court by a member of the Bar of Ohio.

GRADUATION AND DEGREES

The degree of Bachelor of Laws will be conferred upon Regular Students who complete the prescribed courses of study in a manner satisfactory to the Board of Trustees.

Credit toward graduation will be given for not more than one year's study of law under the actual tuition of a reputable practicing attorney-at-law. Such study must be proved by the certificate of such attorney-at-law, not only as to the length of time spent in study, but as to the subjects studied, the text or case books which formed the basis of study, and the quality of the work done by the student.

Credit toward graduation will be given for not more than two years' study of law in residence at any reputable law school.

No credit will be given for correspondence school work.

No student will be graduated who has not studied law for a period equivalent to six school semesters, of which time a period equivalent to at least four school semesters must have been spent in residence at some reputable law school, and of which at least the last two semesters must have been spent in residence at The John Marshall School of Law.

Rates for special courses may be obtained from the Dean.

All fees are payable in advance.

The annual tuition is payable as follows:

One-fourth upon entrance, one-fourth November 15, one-fourth February 1, and one-fourth April 1.

Tuition is made payable in quarterly installments for the convenience of our students, but these installments are invariably payable in advance as above.

"Forum" dues must be paid on registration. This fund is disbursed by the student organization known as "The Forum." All text books are received on consignment and the school is required to make prompt remittance covering books sold. Therefore, the school can not carry book accounts.

ADMISSION TO THE BAR

Applicants for admission to the bar, upon entering the school, should register with the Clerk of the Supreme Court, as required by law. Students are advised to do this through the office of the school in order to avoid the consequences of failure to so register.

Applicants for admission to the Ohio bar must have studied law for four years after the date of their registration with the Ohio Supreme Court.

The regular school year of The John Marshall School of Law is counted as one year of study under the above requirement.

Every applicant for admission to the bar must pass the State bar examination. Such examinations are held each year at Columbus on the first Thursday, Friday and Saturday after the first Tuesday in January and on the last Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday in June.

In June, 1927, Einar G. Carlson, one of our graduates, won first place in a class of 623 candidates.

In December, 1925, Joseph L. Witte won second place in the state bar examination.

In December, 1923, Jules A. Eshner, a graduate of this school, won second place in the state bar examination.

In June, 1922, Andrew H. Brown, one of our graduates, won first place in a class of 376 candidates.

In June, 1921, Burt W. Griffin, stood first in a large class.

In December, 1920, Frank J. Lausche won second place, and in December, 1919, Emery C. Smith stood second.

METHOD OF INSTRUCTION

The system of instruction followed combines the study of the rules and principles of the law as set forth by text-writers, and the analysis and statement of leading cases with special reference to Ohio law. The instruction is designed not only to fix in the memory the great fundamental principles of law, but to stimulate mental energy and to develop power in the analysis of selected cases.

Each student is required to attend lectures six hours per week with substantial regularity.

OPTIONAL WEDNESDAY MEETINGS

To supplement the work of the class room, two hours each Wednesday evening are devoted to lectures and discussions conducted by judges, lawyers and business men. Attendance upon these meetings is purely optional. The schedule of the regular classes is arranged so as not to conflict with the Wednesday evening sessions. These meetings are designed to stimulate interest among the students in the various social sciences, to acquaint them with able men in all walks of life, and to give them a broader outlook upon human activities as well as a clearer understanding of the significance of thorough preparedness in the law.

A course of lectures on Public Law will be given under the following sub-heads:

- I. The Federal Government—Hon. Wilfred J. Mahon.
(U. S. District Attorney)
- II. The State Government—Hon. Harold H. Burton, A.B., LL.B.
(Member General Assembly)
- III. The County Government—David R. Hertz, A.B., LL.B.
(Asst. County Prosecutor)
- IV. The City Government—

In addition, George W. Spooner will lecture on "The Psychology of Trial Work," followed by Moot Court under Hon. Carl V. Weygandt, Judge of the Court of Common Pleas. Hon Samuel H. Silbert, Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, will consider the "History of Jurisprudence" in a brief course. Ben F. Levin, Ass't Director of Law in charge of the Criminal Branch has chosen "The Psychology of Defense in Criminal Trials" as his subject.

Other interesting men will be invited to speak on selected subjects as the year progresses.

UNDERGRADUATE COURSE OF STUDY

The course of study is distributed over four years. Although particular attention is paid to the law of Ohio, the course is designed to train students in the principles of the common law and equity, and to prepare them for the practice of law in Ohio or in any other jurisdiction.

The foregoing courses are the minimum requirement for admission to the Ohio bar, under the amended rules.

DETAILED DESCRIPTION OF REQUIRED COURSES

FIRST YEAR

1. *Contracts.*

This course deals with the general principles of contract law, such as the nature, formation, interpretation, operation and discharge of contracts, and aims to furnish a foundation for the study of the special applications of contract law—as in insurance, bailments, negotiable instruments, agency, partnership, equity, jurisdiction over contracts, etc.—which are treated in separate courses.

*This course is offered twice a year. From February first to the time of the June examination, and from August fifteenth to the time of the December examination.

TEXT: Clark on Contracts (3rd edition); Throckmorton's Cases on Contracts.

JUDGE MECK or MR. HOSFORD. Three hours per week; 66 hours.

2. *Criminal Law and Criminal Procedure.*

This course aims to give a comprehensive view of the criminal law, common and statutory, special attention being paid to definitions which form an important element in criminal law and frequently furnish the key to the solution of some of its most difficult problems.

The course in criminal procedure is designed to be as full and as realistic as possible. The case is dealt with in all of its phases, from the commission of the crime to the termination of the prosecution therefor.

The preliminary subjects of arrest, examination and commitment, and the like, are treated.

Then follows the formation of the grand jury and the indictment or presentment.

The student is then taught how to arraign the prisoner, enter pleas, and conduct the trial throughout.

TEXT: Clark on Criminal Law and Criminal Procedure.

MR. MEYER or MR. CONNELL. Three hours per week; 42 hours.

3. *Torts.*

In this course is comprised a comprehensive study of the entire subject of wrongs to person and property. It includes, besides a consideration of specific wrongs, such as slander, libel, malicious prosecution, false imprisonment, assault and battery, fraud, trespass, nuisance, and the like, a survey of the nature of torts in general and of the principle of liability. To the subject of negligence is given the special consideration which its importance demands.

The subject of master and servant is taught as a branch of the law of torts. The topics treated are those of independent contractors; the master's liability for the torts and crimes of his servant; the master's liability for injuries to his servants; the servant's liability for his own torts; and the liability of third persons for torts to master or servant. Special consideration is given to the Federal Employers' Liability Act, and to State legislation along similar lines.

TEXT: Chapin on Torts and Chapin's Cases on Torts.

MR. LAWRENCE. Three hours per week; 54 hours.

4. *Agency.*

This course embraces the relations of principal and agent as formed by agreement, ratification or estoppel; the obligations of the relation; its legal effect as between principal and agent, principal and third persons, agent and third persons.

TEXT: Huffcut on Agency.

MR. MILLER. Three hours per week; 42 hours.

SECOND YEAR

1. *Real Property.*

Since some knowledge of the history of the law of real property is essential to an understanding of its principles, the subject is taught historically as well as philosophically and practically. A series of introductory lectures is given on the feudal land tenures, and the changes made therein are then explained and traced through the modern English tenures to the present system of land titles in the United States. Consideration is given to the different estates in land, whether corporeal or incorporeal, in possession or in expectancy, in fee, for life, or for years. Special attention is paid to remainders, executory limitations, dower and curtesy, and the modes by which the various estates in land may be created or transferred.

TEXT: Tiffany on Real Property.

MR. LINDEMANN. Three hours per week; 72 hours.

2. *Personal Property.*

This course embraces a treatment of the nature of property, the kinds of personal property, distinction between real and personal property, and the nature and acquisition of rights in personal property.

TEXT: Bigelow's Cases on Personal Property.

MR. LINDEMANN. Three hours per week; 36 hours.

3. *Negotiable Instruments.*

The formal requirements of negotiability; the rights of bona fide purchasers; the contract of indorsement; the steps necessary to hold indorsers; promissory notes; drafts or bills of exchange and checks, under the Law Merchant and Negotiable Instruments Act.

TEXT: The Negotiable Instruments Law.

MR. BARKLEY. Three hours per week; 36 hours.

4. *Bailments and Carriers.*

Definition, classification and general principles of bailments; bailment, mutuum, and sale distinguished; liens, pledges, warehousemen, inn-keepers.

The law of common carriers of goods and passengers is fully treated including the rights of the public as well as those of the shipper, consignee and passenger in his relations to the carrier. The subjects of bills of lading, connecting carriers, stoppage in transitu, right of passengers as to tickets and baggage, and action for injuries to passengers, are fully discussed.

Especial consideration is given to the changes introduced into the law of carriers as to contractual limitations of liability by the Interstate Commerce Act.

TEXT: Dobie on Bailments and Carriers.

JUDGE MECK or MR. BARKLEY. Three hours per week. 36 hours.

5. *Domestic Relations.*

This course embraces a thorough discussion of the law of husband and wife, parent and child, and guardian and ward, and a general discussion of the law relating to aliens and insane persons.

As part of the law of husband and wife, the subjects of marriage and divorce receive careful consideration.

The rights, duties, and liability in respect to person and property, at common law, and under modern statutes, growing out of the marriage relation, and the relation of parent and child, and of guardian and ward, are fully considered and explained.

TEXT: Cooley on Domestic Relations, and Cases.

MR. MORGENSTERN. Three hours per week; 36 hours.

THIRD YEAR

1. *Equity.*

This course is intended to ground the student thoroughly in the nature and fundamental principles of equity jurisdiction. The origin of courts of equity and the development of equity jurisdiction and its relation to the common law are carefully explained, and the general principles of modern equity jurisprudence discussed.

Much attention is paid to such important topics as trusts, mortgages, fraud, mistake, the doctrine of notice, election, conversion,

etc., as well as to the various equitable remedies, such as specific performance, injunction, reformation, accounting, and the like.

TEXT: Eaton and Eaton's Cases.

MR. HERTZ or MR. PERRIS. Three hours per week; 54 hours.

2. *Pleading.*

The student of this course is first given the history and purpose of pleading, followed by the philosophy. He is then briefly made acquainted with the procedure under the Civil Law, Common Law and Equity systems with emphasis, however, upon Common Law pleading. The fundamental principles of this great system are thoroughly studied as well as the different kinds of actions under the Common Law, and particular attention is called to all such matters and things as are now employed in the modern procedure under the Code. After completing the history, philosophy, and different early methods of procedure, Code pleading is taken up and thoroughly studied from a general as well as a particular viewpoint—using Judge Phillips' text for the former and Whittaker's Annotated Code of Ohio for the latter. The petition, answer and reply as well as the motion and demurrer are thoroughly studied in detail and the student given special instructions how to prepare the necessary papers in bringing a case judicially to the Court's attention. In so far as time will permit, error and appeal are given consideration. Pleadings are also drawn by the student so that he may be familiar and at ease in presenting a case when admitted.

TEXT: Phillips on Code Pleading.

JUDGE RUHL. Three hours per week; 54 hours.

3. *Evidence.*

This course includes the topics usually coming under this head, such as the definition, nature and different kinds of evidence, judicial notice, burden of proof, the rules as to competency, and effect of evidence, the hearsay and parol evidence rules, the law of witnesses, documentary evidence, etc. In addition to imparting a theoretical knowledge of the principles involved, every effort is made to give the student a practical working knowledge of the subject, so as to enable him to conduct a case through the ordinary course of judicial investigation.

TEXT: Hughes on Evidence, and Hughes' Cases.

MR. MILLER. Three hours per week; 54 hours.

4. *Wills and Administration of Estates.*

The law of descent and distribution; testamentary capacity; execution, revocation, and revival of wills; construction of wills;

ademption and lapse of legacies; executors and administrators; payment of legacies; distribution of estates.

TEXT: Gardner on Wills.

MR. MILLER. Three hours per week; 54 hours.

FOURTH YEAR

1. *Law of Associations (Partnership and Private Corporations).*

In this course a study is made of the law relating to various forms of business associations. Some time is devoted to a brief treatment of the leading principles of the law of partnership both at common law and under the Uniform Partnership Acts; limited partnerships, the joint stock company, and the use of the business trust.

The remainder of the course is devoted to a study of the law of private corporations—their promotion, de facto corporations, ultra vires acts, liability for torts and crimes, the rights and liabilities of officers, stockholders, and creditors, and the reorganization of corporations.

TEXTS: Clark and Mechem.

MR. REASNER. Three hours per week; 54 hours.

2. *Suretyship.*

Attention is paid to the distinction between suretyship and guaranty; to the requisites and construction of the contract of the principal and surety, to the rights, obligations, and defences of the surety, at law and in equity, in relation to the creditor, principal debtor, and co-sureties, whether the surety's obligation be collateral or original; and to the comparatively new subject on compensated suretyship.

TEXT: De Witt's Stearns on Suretyship.

MR. LAWRENCE. Three hours per week; 24 hours.

3. *Constitutional Law.*

The course in Constitutional Law embraces a study of the Federal Constitution, as interpreted by the courts, including a discussion of the subject of interstate commerce, ex post facto laws, impairing the obligations of contracts, due process of law, eminent domain, the police power, etc.

TEXT: Black on Constitutional Law.

MR. FULLMER. Three hours per week; 30 hours.

4. *Legal Bibliography (Law Books—Their Meaning and Uses).*

This course aims to develop in the student a knowledge of the repositories of the law, ability to use the law library efficiently, and power to judge of the weight of various authorities. It concludes with practical instruction in the formulation of legal argument and the preparation of briefs.

MR. HERTZ. 8 Hours.

5. *Senior Review Course.*

On the completion of the advanced work in the Senior year, as a preparation for the bar examination, a review of all the branches of the law required by the Ohio Supreme Court for admission to the bar is undertaken by a member of our regular faculty who is a master in this field.

This is not a quiz course, but a comprehensive review requiring the examination of hundreds of recent decisions.

MR. BARKLEY. 100 hours.

All courses are subject to re-assignment at any time.

POST-GRADUATE COURSE OF STUDY

A law school course should not be confined to the study of the principles of substantive law. So far as possible a student should learn how to apply these principles to the more common problems encountered in practice.

Although it is true that the details of practice can be mastered only after years of experience, yet it is the function of a well organized law school to lessen the gap existing between the law graduate and the successful practitioner.

To this end and in response to the demand from her alumni for an opportunity for further study, The John Marshall School of Law submits a post-graduate course leading to the LL.M. degree. This course covers one year of intensive study under specialists in their respective fields.

The post-graduate course of study consists of five major subjects and ten minor subjects.

Moot Court.

In connection with the body of the law of procedure, a moot court is organized in the Senior year. The cases are selected and the facts outlined by the instructor. Students are assigned for the plaintiff and defendant. The law pertaining to the case is prepared, the pleadings are drawn, and the case is carefully and fully presented to the court and jury as would be done in an actual trial.

JUDGE BAER OR JUDGE WEYGANDT.

The post-graduate course is open only to members of the bar who hold the LL.B. degree.

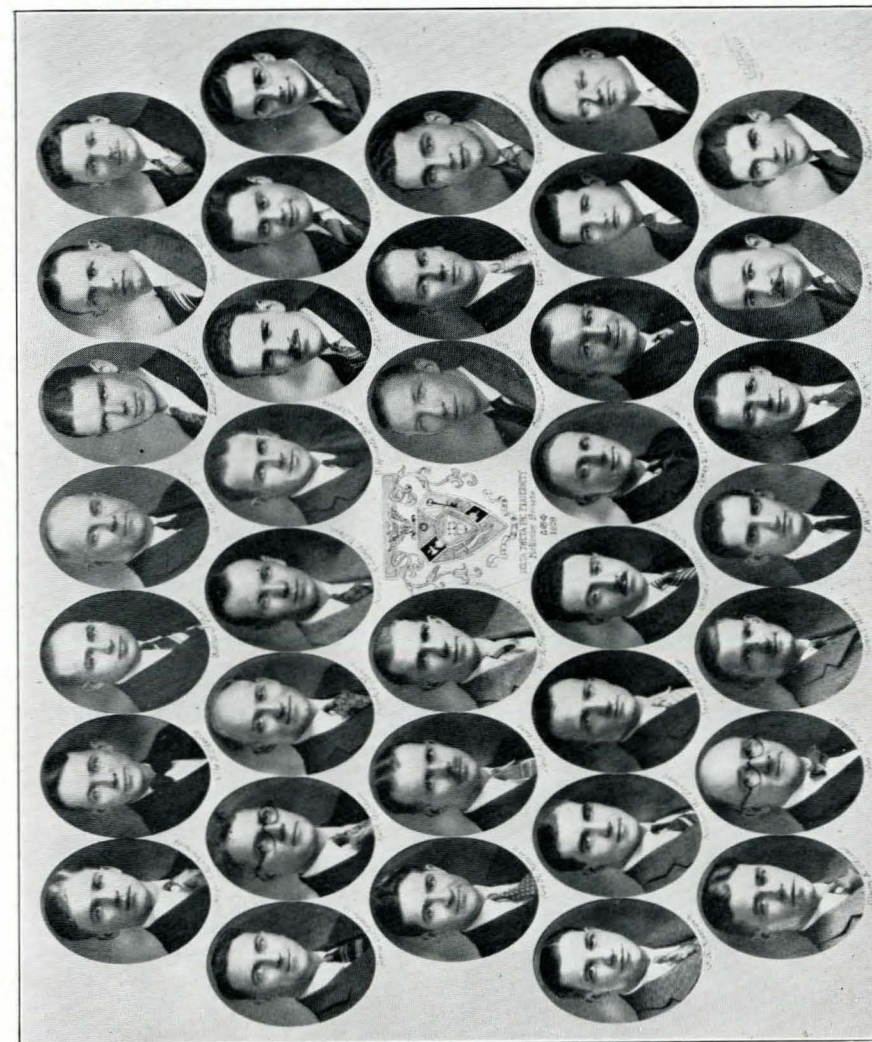
DELTA THETA PHI now has 64 active senates and 26 alumni senates located in all parts of the country with representatives at every leading university and law school.

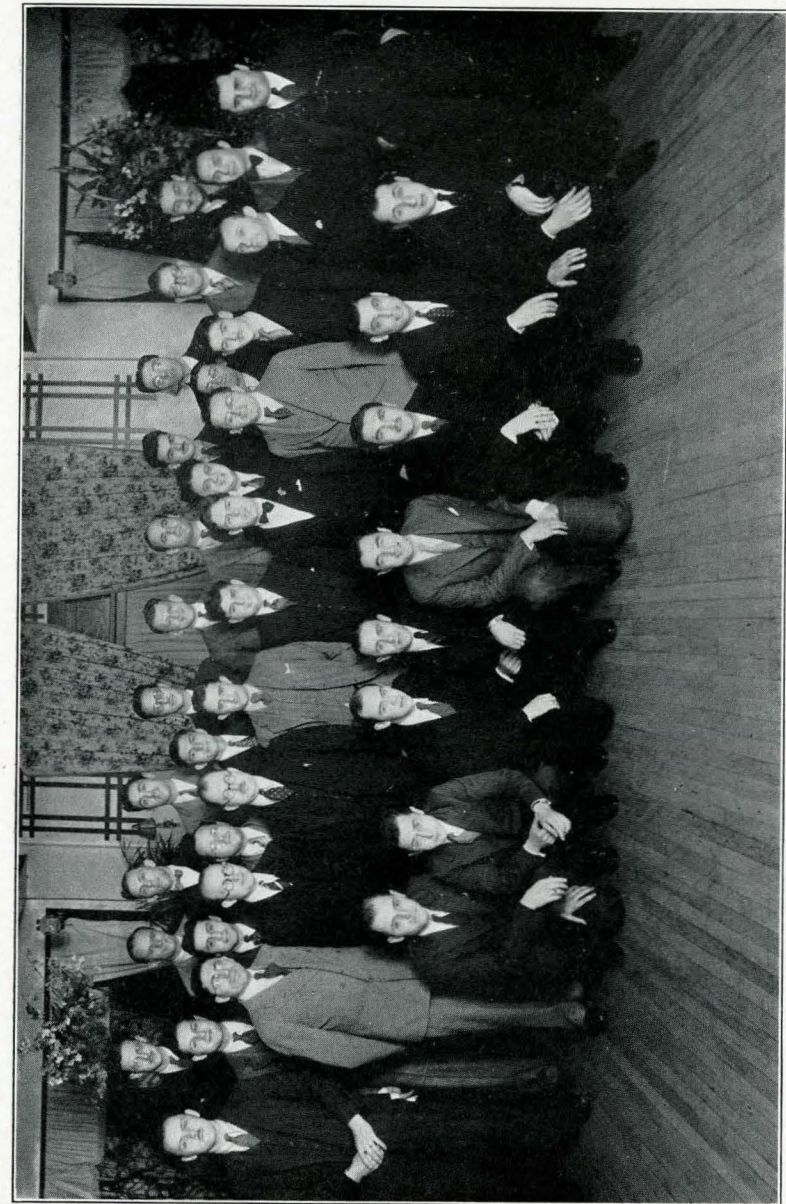
The Fraternity, from its inception, has been engaged in promoting the welfare of the student body by affording good fellowship among its members, and fostering closer contacts with the faculty.
