HISTORY

In 1916 a number of prominent attorneys of Cleveland, desirous of raising the general standard of legal attainment, and feeling the need in the community of a school of law that should be rigidly thorough and at the same time entirely practical in its teaching, formed an association to realize their ideals.

The founders' plans were of an unusually broad and liberal character and anticipated in surprising degree the wide and distinctive service now rendered by the institution which they founded and which carries the name of the nation's greatest juristic genius, John Marshall. The new institution opened its doors on September 20, 1916, and so immediate was the response it received and so eminently successful were the results of its first year's instruction, that at the close of the year in May, 1917, it became affiliated with Ohio Northern University.

After six years of the most cordial relations with the university, it was deemed advisable to secure a charter from the state of Ohio, authorizing The John Marshall School of Law to confer degrees in its own name. Such a charter was secured in January, 1924. This charter puts The John Marshall School of Law on a par with the best law schools in the state and insures freedom to respond to the advance in ideas of legal education.

PURPOSE

The John Marshall School of Law is distinctly a lawyer's school. Its faculty is composed of successful attorneys in active practice, who are also experienced in teaching. Every effort is made to admit as candidates for a degree only such students as give promise by their education, attainments and character of becoming honorable and worthy practitioners of the law.

The most noteworthy feature in the progress of legal education in the United States has been the development of efficient law schools. "Reading law" in a lawyer's office is of unquestionable value because of the familiarity it gives with the routine work and everyday practice of the profession, but in training a lawyer, it can never take the place of the thorough, systematic instruction given by a good law school. The course of study covered by The John Marshall School of Law embraces the entire field of law and is designed to develop the student, and to fit him for the active duties of a practicing lawyer.

The instruction is founded upon the conviction that the law is a science and is designed to teach the principles of law, their history and reason and to develop the powers of analysis, discrimination and judgment essential to the practical application of these principles.

LOCATION

The John Marshall School of Law for the first three years was located in the Guardian Building, where it occupied comfortable quarters which were ample during the school's infancy.

The rapidly increasing attendance soon called for more commodious quarters. The school is now located at 242-248 Superior Avenue, opposite the Federal Building, where it occupies approximately 4,000 feet of floor space—ample room for the present and immediate future.

The location is unsurpassed. It is only a step to the Municipal Court, the Court of Common Pleas, the Court of Appeals, and the United States District Court. The student is only a few minutes from the leading law firms of the city.

LIBRARY FACILITIES

The John Marshall School of Law has an excellent law library. Here the student has access to the Ohio State Reports and Digests, Ohio Court of Appeals Reports, the United States Reports and Digests, Cyc., Corpus Juris, the Ohio Statutes, law dictionaries and a stack of supplemental text books for reference. Students may also arrange to use the Cleveland Law Library in the New Court House, one of the largest and finest collections of Law literature in America.

The student also has access to the public library, where he will find a fine collection of current literature. Adequate library facilities are a prime essential to the student of Law.

OPPORTUNITY FOR LEGAL STUDY

No city in the country affords better facilities for legal study than Cleveland. Here sit the District Court of the United States; the Appellate Court of Ohio; the Common Pleas Courts; the Probate Court of Cuyahoga County; the Cleveland Municipal Courts, and the Admiralty and Insolvency Courts. Cleveland affords an opportunity to follow the progress of a case from the lowest to the highest court, with few exceptions.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION AND CLASSIFICATION OF STUDENTS

Students may enter the School at any time, but in order to receive full credit toward graduation for work done must enter at the beginning of a semester.

Candidates for admission to the bar and for a degree will be required, upon their application for admission, to furnish satisfactory evidence of the completion of two years of college work. Such are known as Regular Students.

Students not candidates for admission to the bar and for a degree may enter upon proving to the satisfaction of the Dean that they possess such general education as will enable them to pursue the study of law intelligently. Such are known as Special Students.

Candidates for admission to the Ohio bar will be required to conform to the provisions of Rule XIV, as amended and promulgated by the Ohio Supreme Court.

Credit toward graduation will be given for not more than three years of law study in residence in any reputable part-time law school, or more than two years of law study in any reputable full-time law school.

Credit toward graduation will be given for not more than one year's study of law under the actual tuition of a reputable practicing attorney-at-law. Such study must be proved by the certificate of such attorney-at-law, not only as to the length of time spent in study, but as to the subjects studied, the text or case books which formed the basis of study, and the quality of the work done by the student.

No credit will be given for instruction received by correspondence.

In any event the last two semesters must have been spent in residence in The John Marshall School of Law.

The Supreme Court of Ohio

RULE XIV.

ADMISSION TO THE BAR.

SECTION 1. Except as provided in Section 1703 General Code, concerning persons who have been admitted and practiced in the highest court of another state, or in the Supreme Court of the United States, for a period of five years, no person shall be admitted to the bar except upon an examination and certificate of the Standing Committee on Examinations.

SECTION 2. There shall be appointed, to take effect on the first day of January, 1901, ten discreet and judicious attorneys and counselors-at-law to be known as the Standing Committee on Examinations. Two members of the committee shall be appointed for one year, two for two years, two for three years, two for four years,

and two for five years. Their successors shall be appointed for a term of five years each.

SECTION 3. The Standing Committee shall hold examinations of applicants for admission to the Bar in the City of Columbus, Ohio on the first Wednesday, Thursday and Friday after the first Tuesday in January and on the last Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of June. No other examinations will be held. Examinations must be conducted under the direction of the Committee.

Each examiner shall grade the papers of the applicants in the subjects in which he has submitted questions and forward his report to the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, who shall cause the grades to be tabulated.

SECTION 3a. No applicant shall be admitted unless he has sustained on his written answers to the questions of the examiners an average grade of 75 percent on an examination embracing the following subjects:—

The law of real and personal property, torts, contracts, evidence, pleading, partnership, negotiable instruments, agency, suretyship, domestic relations, wills, *private corporations, municipal corporations, trusts, conflict of laws*, equity, criminal law, constitutional law, and the canons of professional ethics adopted by the Ohio State Bar Association, at its 30th annual meeting, 1909. (*This amendment, adopted March 15, 1934, shall be effective as to the examination to be held in June, 1935 and thereafter.*)

SECTION 3b. None but citizens of the United States will be admitted to the examination and every applicant must be twenty-one years of age. The printed interrogatories and the answers of applicants thereto shall be submitted to the Court with the report of the examiners, and, together with all certificates and papers required under this rule, shall be filed with the Clerk and preserved.

SECTION 4. REQUIREMENTS AS TO GENERAL LEARNING.

Each applicant for registration as a law student must present a certificate of general learning with his certificate that he has begun the study of law. Such certificate of general learning shall meet the following requirements:

- A. If filed between the 15th day of October, 1926, and the 15th day of October, 1927, it shall show that the applicant has successfully completed one year of study in an approved college, to be evidenced by the signature of the proper official thereof.
- B. On and after October 15, 1927, it shall show that the applicant has successfully completed two years of study in an approved college, to be evidenced by the signature of the proper official thereof.

C. It shall further show—

- (1) That the requirements for admission to the college issuing the same are at least 15 units of high school credits and that the applicant satisfied said requirements.
 - (2) The period of the applicant's attendance.
 - (3) The number of college credits, which shall be not less than 30 semester hours, or 45 quarter hours, for each year of study in an approved college.
- D. Applicants who register or apply for examination under the provisions of sections 7 or 8 of this rule shall be required to file certificates of general learning as provided in paragraphs "A", "B" and "C" hereof, at the time of such registration or application.
 - E. All credentials presented under this rule must be submitted to the Court and if the Court is satisfied that the applicant has the educational qualifications required he will be admitted to registration. All credentials presented shall be filed with the Clerk.
 - F. The Clerk of this Court is authorized to accept certificates which clearly meet the requirements of this section.
 - G. Diplomas should not be presented. Certificates which may be retained permanently are desired. They should be upon the official stationery of the college or university in which the applicant carried on the study required.
 - H. Questions as to whether a particular college is an approved college within the meaning of this section, and questions as to the value to be given to credits presented from a college not approved, and questions relating to the sufficiency of the credits presented by an applicant, shall be referred to an examiner appointed by this Court, and his determination of such questions shall be final and shall be reported to this Court for record. (Effective January 14, 1924.)
 - I. Members of the Ohio Association of Colleges are "approved colleges". A Junior College or school of full-time or part time study, where instruction is given covering only the first two years of ordinary collegiate work, is an "approved college", if it complies with the following requirements:
 - (1) It must be a non-commercial enterprise, conducted by an institution of recognized responsibility and standing.
 - (2) It must offer instruction only in courses of study of collegiate grade.
 - (3) It must compute the credit hours, whether semester or quarter hours, on a basis equivalent to the number of

hours of classroom instruction required by the standard of the Ohio Association of Colleges, for each such hour of credit.

- (4) It must possess at least one full-time administrative officer.
- (5) Its recognition as an "approved college" shall not be made contingent upon any requirement of form of endowment, nor upon any prescribed number of full-time instructors, nor upon the circumstance that instruction be given, wholly or partly, in the evening. (Adopted Nov. 19, 1929.)

- J. Certificates of general learning meeting the requirements of Section 4 as the same existed immediately prior to the adoption of this amendment will be accepted for registration until October 15, 1926.
- K. Applicants who registered prior to June 7, 1923, who have not yet filed certificates of general learning, may qualify in that respect by filing a certificate meeting the requirements of Section 4, as the same existed immediately prior to the adoption of this amendment.

SECTION 5. The Court will not receive applications for waiver of the requirements mentioned in Section 4 (effective January 14, 1926).

SECTION 6. REGISTRATION REQUIREMENTS.

- A. Every resident of the state who commences the study of law on and after *June 1, 1934*, either under the tuition of an attorney at law or at a law school, whether located in this state or elsewhere, shall file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court his application for registration as a candidate for admission to the bar, accompanied by the certificate of his preceptor or the chief officer of such law school, as the case may be, and by answers in duplicate to a questionnaire executed by him under oath, such questionnaire to be upon a form prescribed by the Court, and also accompanied by a fee of three dollars.
- B. Upon the filing of such application and questionnaire one copy of the questionnaire shall be referred by the Clerk to a committee to be designated by the local bar association or associations as hereinafter provided, in the county where such candidate claims permanent residence.
- C. Such committee, so designated by the local bar association or associations, shall proceed to investigate the character, reputation and moral qualifications of each candidate whose questionnaire is submitted to it and shall obtain answers to

questionnaires from three citizens of the county, not related to the applicant, at least one of whom shall not be a member of the bar, and from two members of the said local bar association committee who have personally investigated the candidate's qualifications, such questionnaires from the members and citizens to be in the form prescribed by the Supreme Court of Ohio.

- D. The Supreme Court shall determine from the report of the local bar association committee and from the questionnaires filed by said committee and the candidate and from such other information as may be available, whether the candidate shall be accepted for registration, and shall notify the candidate whether his application for registration has been accepted or rejected. As to such persons as are accepted for registration the period required for the study of law by the rules of this Court shall date from the filing of the application of such candidate.
- E. The president of each local bar association, or if there be more than one, then the presidents of such local bar associations, shall appoint a Committee on Applicants for Admission to the Bar, which Committee shall consist of three or more members of each county, as the Court shall from time to time determine, and the members thereof shall serve without compensation. Upon the original appointment one-third of said members shall be appointed for one year, one-third for two years, and one-third for three years and their successor thereafter appointed for a term of three years each. Said Committee on Applicants for Admission to the Bar shall be charged with the duty of passing upon the character, reputation and moral qualifications of candidates for registration in accordance with the rules from time to time prescribed by the Supreme Court. Said Committees in their examination of the candidate shall employ the questionnaires hereinbefore prescribed and shall report to the Clerk of the Supreme Court the result of their investigation and their recommendations as to the acceptance or rejection of such candidates as registered law students. (Adopted March 15, 1934.)
- F. Before any application for registration shall be filed such person shall present to the Clerk of this Court satisfactory evidence of general educational attainments as required by Section 4 of this rule.

SECTION 7. Every person who shall commence the study of law while a non-resident of this state, and who has not been regularly admitted as an attorney-at-law in some court of record within

the United States, shall, *at least one year before admission to an examination*, file with the Clerk an affidavit showing that he has come into the state for the purpose of making it his permanent residence, and stating his name, age, present and former residence, and also the certificate of his preceptor, or of the chief officer of his law school, showing the time when, and place or places where, and under whom, he has studied law; which papers shall be accompanied by a certificate of general learning as required by Section 4, a *questionnaire as required by Section 6*, of this rule, and by a fee of three dollars.

The one year's residence in this state required of such persons by Section 1701 General Code shall date from the filing of such papers. (*As amended March 15, 1934.*)

SECTION 8. Every person entitled to be admitted to the examination under Section 1702, General Code, on the ground that he has been regularly admitted as an attorney and counselor at law in some court of record within the United States, shall, *not less than ninety days* before the time fixed for the examination, file with the Clerk the following credentials:

a. An affidavit showing that he is a citizen of the United States and that he is a resident of this state or that he has come into the state for the purpose of making it his permanent residence, and stating his name, age and former and present residence.

b. His certificate of admission to the bar.

c. The certificate of a judge of the court of record in which he has practiced law, showing the time such judge has personally known him, the period of time he has practiced law and his moral and professional standing at such bar.

d. Certificate of his preceptor or the law school which he attended, showing the period of his study of law. (If the judge's certificate mentioned in "c" shows practice for three years or more this certificate is not required.)

e. Certificate of general learning as required by Section 4 of this rule.

f. *Answers in duplicate to a questionnaire upon a form prescribed by this Court.*

g. *A fee of \$18.00 shall accompany the application. (As amended March 15, 1934.)*

SECTION 9. Repealed May 22nd, 1923.

SECTION 10. Except as provided in Section 8, concerning persons who have been admitted to the bar in some Court of record within the United States, every person who desires to have his name enrolled for examination must *not less than ninety days* before the time fixed for the examination, file with the Clerk his application, giving his name, age, residence and postoffice address, and

with such application he shall present a certificate: (1) from a law school where instruction is given during the day time and in which the entire time of the student is devoted to study of legal subjects, whose standing is approved by the Court, certifying that the applicant has regularly and attentively studied in said law school for the period of three school years, or (2) from a law school where the entire time of the student is not devoted to the study of legal subjects, whose standing is approved by the Court, certifying that the applicant has regularly and attentively studied in said law school for the period of four school years, or (3) if the applicant has studied law under the tutorage of an attorney in active practice as the preceptor and instructor of such applicant for a period of four calendar years, and not less than two hundred hours per year of actual legal instruction, the facts with relation to such instruction and practice shall be set forth in such certificate and duly verified by the affidavit of such attorney, showing that during such period he has given actual instruction for the required number of hours in the subjects enumerated in Section 3a of this rule.*

Provided, that students heretofore registered will be required to show compliance with this rule covering the period from and after January 15th, 1924; and in no case will the certificate of another attorney or counselor at law be received unless it be shown by the affidavit of the applicant that his preceptor is dead or that his certificate cannot for some reason satisfactory to the Court, be obtained, but in such case the certificate must show that the certifier has personal knowledge of the length of time the applicant has been engaged in the study of law; also that the said certificates shall show the name and postoffice address of the applicant's preceptor. Each applicant for admission to such examination shall be required to state in an affidavit filed by him on his application for admission to such examination, that he is a citizen of the United States and that he has resided in the State of Ohio for the year last past, and that he has read the Canons of Professional Ethics, adopted by the Ohio State Bar Association July 7, 1909, and has faithfully endeavored to make himself acquainted with the same, and that he will endeavor to conform his professional conduct thereto. (*As amended Jan. 15, 1924, and Feb. 25, 1925.*)†

SECTION 11. No certificate, affidavit, or other paper produced

*The Court has ruled that no additional credit will be allowed to law school students for law study under attorneys between law school terms; nor is any additional credit allowed to such students for part time study in law offices during school terms.

†NOTE:—Any student may obtain a copy of the American Bar Association publication containing above named Canons of Professional Ethics by application to the Clerk of the Supreme Court. Blank application for admission to the examination should also be obtained from the clerk.

in conformity with this rule shall be deemed conclusive evidence of the facts therein stated, and in all cases the court must be satisfied of the truth thereof before the applicant shall be admitted to examination.

SECTION 12. Each application for examination shall be accompanied by an examination fee, as follows: *First examination, fifteen dollars; second examination, twenty dollars; third examination, twenty-five dollars; and fourth examination, twenty-five dollars.* Such fee will be returned to the applicant if his name is not placed on the examination roll. If an applicant, on examination, be rejected, he may be admitted to the next examination upon filing a certificate from a law school or a practicing attorney, as required by Section 10 of this rule, *that he has studied law for the period of time between receipt of notice of failure until the date of the next examination.* No one shall be admitted to more than four examinations. *(As amended March 15, 1934. Effective as to examination to be held in June, 1934, and thereafter.)*

SECTION 13. After the expiration of the thirtieth day before the examination the court will examine the papers filed by the applicant, and cause him to be notified whether he will be admitted to the examination unconditionally, or subject to the production of a supplemental certificate of additional study, when that may be necessary, and if so admitted, will cause his name to be placed on the examination roll which will be delivered to the Standing Committee.

SECTION 14. The Standing Committee may, subject to the approval of the court, make rules not inconsistent herewith, for the conduct of the examinations, which, together with this rule, shall be published in pamphlet form for distribution by the Standing Committee.

SECTION 15. The applicant upon receiving the oath of office, shall sign a roll showing the date of his admission and the place of his residence. The oath administered shall be as follows:

I DO SOLEMNLY SWEAR:

I will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Ohio;

I will maintain the respect due to courts of justice and judicial officers;

I will not counsel or maintain any suit or proceeding which shall appear to me to be unjust, nor any defense except such as I believe to be honestly debatable under the law of the land;

I will employ for the purpose of maintaining the

causes confided to me such means only as are consistent with truth and honor, and will never seek to mislead the judge or jury by any artifice or false statement of fact or law;

I will maintain the confidence and preserve inviolate the secrets of my client, and will accept no compensation in connection with his business except from him or with his knowledge and approval;

I will abstain from all offensive personality, and advance no fact prejudicial to the honor or reputation of a party or witness, unless required by the justice of the cause with which I am charged;

I will never reject, from any consideration personal to myself, the cause of the defenseless or oppressed, or delay any man's cause for lucre or malice. **SO HELP ME GOD.**

SECTION 16. The Clerk shall enter the date of the filing of all papers under this rule, with a pertinent description of the same, in a record provided for that purpose, and shall enter all sums received under this rule in a cash book, showing the date, from whom and for what received, and shall pay the same out upon the order of the Chief Justice in payment of the expenses of the examination, and for no other purpose. That is to say: costs of necessary printing and stationery; necessary janitor or messenger service; necessary hall rent, postage and express charges and other necessary expenses; to each member of the Standing Committee his necessary traveling expenses actually incurred in the work of the Committee *and such compensation as the Court may from time to time determine*; to the Clerk \$1.00 for each certificate of admission or duplicate certificate of admission issued by him and also \$1.00 for each certificate of registration filed by him under this rule. \$1.00 will be charged for each duplicate certificate.

If the funds are not sufficient, such pro rata distribution shall be made as the funds will warrant. *(As amended March 15, 1934. Effective June 1, 1934.)*

SECTION 17. The following form must be used for the certificate by a preceptor, mentioned in Section 10-12, of this rule.

SECTION 19. Certificates of study given by schools known as correspondence law schools, or by lawyers without the state, certifying that the applicant has studied under their supervision within the state of Ohio, do not satisfy the Ohio statute and the rules respecting study ordered by the Supreme Court of Ohio, and such certificates will not be filed or in any way recognized.

ADMISSION WITHOUT EXAMINATION

SECTION 20. An applicant for admission to the bar of Ohio without examination, under Section 1703, General Code, must file with the Clerk the following credentials:

1. Certificate of admission as an attorney and counsellor-at-law in the highest Court of another state, upon a regular examination, after *three (3) years study of law, preceded by a general education equal to the requirements prescribed by this Court for applicants for admission to the Bar examination in this state in effect*

at the date of such admission, which general education, law study and examination must be shown either by a certificate of the facts or by a requirement thereof in the statute of such state. Provided, that if such applicant shall submit proof of ten years of active practice of law this amendment of the rule shall not apply. (As amended March 16, 1932.)

2. Certificate from the Judge of the Court of Record in which the applicant practiced, that he is of good moral character and that he has been an active practitioner in good and regular standing, in the courts of such state or in the Supreme Court of the United States for a period of not less than five years immediately preceding his removal to the State of Ohio. This certificate must be authenticated by the Clerk of Courts under seal.

3. Certificate of good moral character, and recommendation from some attorney-at-law of this state, that the applicant be admitted to the bar of Ohio.

4. The affidavit of the applicant that he is a citizen of the United States, and that he is a resident of this state, or has come into the state for the purpose of making it his permanent residence.

5. *A questionnaire as required by Section 6 of this rule.*

A fee of \$25.00 must accompany the application. *(As amended March 15, 1934.)*

The applicant is advised that two members of the local Committee on Applicants for Admission to the Bar will personally interview him and may call before them for examination his three citizen sponsors and his preceptor.

GRADUATION AND DEGREES

The degree of Bachelor of Laws will be conferred upon Regular Students who complete the prescribed courses of study in a manner satisfactory to the Board of Trustees.

TUITION AND FEES

PART-TIME SCHOOL

The annual tuition may be paid in 9 monthly installments of \$15.00 each, the first installment to be paid upon entrance and subsequent installments to be paid on the 15th of each month in advance. Or the annual tuition may be paid in 2 installments of \$65.00 each, the first installment to be paid upon entrance

and the second installment to be paid when the second semester begins. Or the annual tuition may be paid upon entrance in one payment of \$125.00.

The school year has been lengthened three weeks to meet the additional requirements for admission to the Ohio bar. The tuition charge per lecture hour has virtually been decreased.

FULL-TIME SCHOOL

The annual tuition may be paid in 9 monthly installments of \$25.00 each, the first installment to be paid upon entrance and subsequent installments to be paid on the 15th of each month in advance.

Or the annual tuition may be paid in 2 installments of \$100.00 each, the first installment to be paid upon entrance and the second installment to be paid when the second semester begins. Or the annual tuition may be paid upon entrance in one payment of \$190.00.

Students will take notice of the time when payments are due. No statements of account will be mailed.

All text books are received for sale on consignment. The school is required to make prompt remittance covering books sold; therefore, the school cannot carry book accounts.

A part-time law school is one that offers lectures in the evening and whose students spend only part of their time in the study of law.

A full-time law school is one that offers lectures in the day time and whose students devote all of their time to the study of law.

REGISTRATION FOR ADMISSION TO THE OHIO BAR

Applicants for admission to the Ohio bar, upon entering the school, must register with the Clerk of the Ohio Supreme Court, and pay the registration fee of \$3.00. Students are advised to do this through the office of the school, to avoid the consequences of failure to register.

Academic credentials must be filed at the same time.

Registration when properly made need not be renewed.

TIME REQUIRED TO QUALIFY FOR ADMISSION

Applicants for admission to the Ohio bar must have studied law

for four years in a part-time law school, after the date of their registration with the Ohio Supreme Court to be admitted to the bar examination. Students pursuing a full-time schedule may qualify in three years of study.

The regular school year of The John Marshall School of Law, either under the part-time schedule or full-time schedule, is counted as one year of study under the above requirement.

METHOD OF INSTRUCTION

The system of instruction combines the study of the rules and principles of the law as set forth by text-writers, and the analysis and statement of leading cases with special reference to Ohio law. The instruction is designed not only to fix in the memory the great fundamental principles of law, but to stimulate mental energy and to develop power in the analysis of selected cases.

A part-time student is required to attend lectures six hours per week with substantial regularity, and a full-time student, twelve hours per week.

UNDERGRADUATE COURSE OF STUDY

While particular attention is paid to the law of Ohio, yet the course is designed to train students in the principles of the common law and equity, and to prepare them for the practice of law in Ohio or in any other jurisdiction.

The Freshman Year begins with Contracts and Criminal Law, followed by Torts, Agency, Personal Property.

The Sophomore Year begins with Personal Property, Common Law Pleading, and Bills and Notes, followed by Public Utilities, Equity I, Domestic Relations, Real Property I and II.

The Junior Year begins with Code Pleading and Evidence, followed by Equity I and II, Wills and Administration of Estates, Constitutional Law, Suretyship.

The Senior Year begins with Trusts, Private Corporations and Partnership (treated together) and Constitutional Law, followed by Conflict of Laws, Suretyship, Municipal Corporations, Review.

Note:—The course of study is undergoing a revision; therefore some subjects appear in more than one year.

DETAILED DESCRIPTION OF REQUIRED COURSES

Contracts

This basic course deals with general principles relating to the nature, formation, operation and discharge of contractual obliga-

tions, and includes a detailed examination of offer and acceptance, the Statute of Frauds, consideration, capacity of parties, fraud, mistake, duress, undue influence, legality of object, contracts for the benefit of third parties, assignment, interpretation of contracts, and discharge of contracts by performance, agreement, breach, impossibility of performance, and by operation of law.

This course is prerequisite to the study of special applications of the law of contracts, such as insurance, bailments, negotiable instruments, agency, partnership and suretyship, which are treated as separate courses.

TEXT: Clark on Contracts (4th Edition); Throckmorton's Cases on Contracts.

MR. MECK.

Criminal Law and Procedure.

This course aims to give a comprehensive view of the criminal law, common and statutory, special attention being paid to definitions which form an important element in criminal law and frequently furnish the key to the solution of some of its most difficult problems.

The course in criminal procedure is designed to be as full and as realistic as possible. The case is dealt with in all of its phases, from the commission of the crime to the termination of the prosecution therefor.

The subjects of arrest, examination, indictment, trial, and criminal evidence are treated in accordance with Ohio's new Code on Criminal Procedure.

TEXT: Clark on Criminal Law; Baldwin's Ohio Code.

MR. CONNELL.

Torts.

In this course is comprised a comprehensive study of the entire subject of wrongs to person and property. It includes, besides a consideration of specific wrongs, such as slander, libel, malicious prosecution, false imprisonment, assault and battery, fraud, trespass, nuisance, and the like, a survey of the nature of torts in general and of the principle of liability. To the subject of negligence is given the special consideration which its importance demands.

The subject of master and servant is taught as a branch of the law of torts. The topics treated are those of independent contractors; the master's liability for the torts and crimes of his servant; the master's liability for injuries to his servants; the servant's liability for his own torts; and the liability of third persons for

torts to master or servant. Special consideration is given to the Federal Employers' Liability Act, and to State legislation along similar lines.

TEXT: Throckmorton's Cooley on Torts.

JUDGE MECK.

Agency.

The course embraces the formation of the agency relationship through contract, ratification, estoppel and necessity; also, the various methods in which an agency may be terminated, who may be an agent or a principal, the legal effect of contracts of an agent in behalf of a disclosed and of an undisclosed principal, admissions and declarations of an agent, notice to an agent and its effect on the liability of the principal, liability of principal for torts of an agent including fraud and misrepresentation, liability of third persons to principal on contract, tort and trust obligations, liability of an agent to third persons, torts between an agent and third persons, the distinction between servant and agent, the master and servant relationship, independent contractors, transfer of servants, compulsory employment and its effect on the liability of the master and the servant, volunteers, liability of master for torts and crimes to and by his servant including public agencies and public charities, liability of master for injuries to servant, the fellow servant rule, contributory negligence, the assumption of risk, and the liability of the servant for torts to his master, fellow servant or third persons. The Industrial Commission and the Workmen's Compensation Act are discussed and their relationship to the master and servant rule shown. Particular attention is paid to the re-statement of the law of agency as adopted and promulgated by the American Law Institute. The students are required in this course to digest typical outstanding cases relating to the law of agency and to draw from facts given a power of attorney and a contract creating the agency relationship.

TEXT: Huffcut on Agency.

MR. MILLER.

Personal Property.

Course embraces a treatment of nature of property, distinction between real and personal property, tangible and intangible property, acquisition and ownership of property, suits to recover property, possessory titles, liens, pledges, bailments, accession, confusion, and gifts of chattels.

TEXT: Larremore's Cases.

MR. LINDEMANN.

Common Law Pleading.

Forms of action—trespass, replevin, detinue, ejectment, trover, covenant, account, debt, assumpsit; the declaration, demurrer, pleas in bar, pleas in abatement.

TEXT: McBane's Cases.

To be assigned.

Bills and Notes.

This course embraces a thorough study of the Uniform Negotiable Instruments Act and cases interpreting the same, including formal requisites, negotiation and discharge of negotiable instruments, the rights and liabilities of all parties thereto, acceptance, presentment for acceptance and acceptance and payment for honor of bills of exchange; also, an investigation of the Law Merchant insofar as it applies to cases not provided for in Uniform Negotiable Instruments Act.

TEXT: The Negotiable Instruments Code.

REFERENCE WORK: Brannan's Negotiable Instrument Law, 5th Edition.

MR. BARKLEY.

Public Utilities.

This course embraces a thorough investigation and discussion of the public utility concept, including a discussion of the nature and rights of public utilities and their obligations with respect to serving the public without discrimination and at reasonable rates, the obligation to furnish adequate facilities and to continue service.

Especial attention is given to the subject of regulation of public utilities at common law and under modern statutes and to special problems arising out of such regulation.

The law of common carriers of goods and passengers and the law of innkeepers is fully treated, including the rights of the public.

TEXT: Robinson's Cases on Public Utilities.

MR. BARKLEY.

Domestic Relations.

The history and development of the law pertaining to marriage and divorce are thoroughly treated. The rights, duties, and obligations arising out of and peculiar to the relations of husband

and wife, parent and child, guardian and ward are exhaustively covered in this course.

The law applicable to alien and insane persons is also given careful attention.

This course is conducted by the thorough discussion of cases and statutes, supplemented by lectures.

LECTURES: Ohio State Cases.

MR. FIORETTE.

Equity.

This course is intended to ground the student thoroughly in the nature and fundamental principles of equity jurisdiction. The origin of courts of equity and the development of equity jurisdiction and its relation to the common law are carefully explained, and the general principles of modern equity jurisprudence discussed.

Much attention is paid to such important topics as trusts, mortgages, fraud, mistake, the doctrine of notice, election, conversion, etc., as well as to the various equitable remedies, such as specific performance, injunction, reformation, accounting, and the like.

TEXT: Cook's Cases.

JUDGE MECK.

Real Property, I and II.

Attention is given to the historical background of the law of real property. Course embraces study of estates, leaseholds, future interests, reversions, remainders, executory interests, co-ownership, dower, fixtures, rights incident to ownership of real property, boundaries, streams, percolating and surface waters, easements, covenants running with the land, restrictions enforceable in equity, conveyancing, adverse possession, prescription, covenants for title, estoppel by deed, personal disabilities, notice priority and recording, and mortgages.

TEXT: Tiffany on Real Property and Ohio Case Law.

MR. LINDEMANN.

Code Pleading.

The student of this course is first given the history and purpose of pleading, followed by the philosophy. He is then briefly made acquainted with the procedure under the Civil Law, Common Law and Equity systems with emphasis, however, upon Common Law pleading. The fundamental principles of this great system are

thoroughly studied as well as the different kinds of actions under the Common Law, and particular attention is called to all such matters and things as are now employed in the modern procedure under the Code. After completing the history, philosophy, and different early methods of procedure, Code pleading is taken up and thoroughly studied from a general as well as a particular view point—using Judge Phillips' text, Second Edition, for the former and Baldwin's Annotated Code of Ohio for the latter. The petition, answer and reply as well as the motion and demurrer are thoroughly studied in detail and the student given special instruction how to prepare the necessary papers in bringing a case judicially to the Court's attention. In so far as time will permit, error and appeal are given consideration. Pleadings are also drawn by the student so that he may be familiar and at ease in presenting a case when admitted.

TEXT: Phillips on Code Pleading, Second Edition.

JUDGE RUHL.

Wills.

The subject covers the history of wills, the distinction between gifts causa mortis and gifts by will, form of wills, agreements to make wills, nuncupative, holographic and conditional wills, joint, mutual and reciprocal wills, testamentary capacity and the tests applied to determine the same, animus testandi, the effect of insanity and eccentricity on the validity of the will, the rule against perpetuities, the effect of mistake, fraud and undue influence on a will, the formal execution and attestation of wills, the revocation and republication of wills, controlling principles in the construction of wills, general, specific and demonstrative legacies, the abatement and ademption of gifts, legacies charged on the land, payment of debts and the effect of insolvency on the will and the various classes of beneficiaries and the election of the widow. Particular attention is paid to the new Ohio Statute of descent and distribution and their relation to partial and void wills. Throughout the course the students are required to draw four wills from a statement of facts given and to have the same properly executed and attested.

TEXT: Gardner on Wills.

MR. MILLER.

Evidence.

The history of the various rules of evidence is emphasized. In addition the course embraces various subjects such as judicial

notice, presumption, burden of proof, admission, confession, law and fact, the *res ipsa loquitor* rule, character evidence, hearsay rule, pedigree and dying declarations, public, ancient and attested documents, account books, entries in the regular course of duty, declarations against interest, declarations relating to physical and mental condition, *res gestae*, rule and opinion evidence, proof of authorship and contents, the parole evidence rule and the exceptions to the same, the competency and incompetency of witnesses, privileged communications, adopting and refreshing recollection, examination of witnesses and the rules governing the manner of asking questions. Particular stress is laid on the trend of the modern law of evidence.

TEXT: To be announced.

MR. MILLER.

Constitutional Law.

The course in Constitutional Law embraces a study of Ohio and Federal Constitutions, as interpreted by the court, including a case study of the subjects of interstate commerce, taxation, equal protection of the laws, impairment of contracts, due process of law, police power, and eminent domain.

Attention is also given to an analysis of the American system of government both from the historical and modern viewpoints including a study of the State and Federal judicial systems and their respective fields of jurisdiction. Significant developments in American Constitutional law are constantly taking place. Current decisions dealing with important constitutional questions are reviewed by lecture from time to time during the course.

TEXT: Long's Cases on Constitutional Law.

MR. FULLMER.

Suretyship.

In this course attention is paid to the distinction between suretyship, guaranty and indemnity, with special emphasis upon the requisites, construction and obligations arising out of the contract of suretyship; the surety's defenses and the surety's rights to exoneration, indemnity, subrogation and contribution.

Through the use of a modern case book the student is able to grasp the general principles of suretyship as they apply to the accommodation surety, and then against this background to trace the principal changes that have taken place since the rise of the corporate surety.

TEXT: Arant's Cases on Suretyship, Second Edition.

MR. MECK.

Law of Associations.

(Partnership, Private Corporations, and Common Law Trusts.)

In this course a study is made of the law relating to various forms of business associations. Some time is devoted to a brief treatment of the leading principles of the law of partnership both at common law and under the Uniform Partnership Acts; limited partnerships, partnership associations, the joint stock company, and the use of the common law business trust.

The remainder of the course is devoted to a study of the law of private corporations—their promotion, *de facto* corporations, *ultra vires* acts, liability for torts and crimes, the rights and liabilities of officers, stockholders, and creditors, and the reorganization of corporations. The legal principles governing partnerships, common law business trusts, and private corporations are compared in this course.

TEXTS: Gilmore's Cases on Partnership; Wormser's Cases on Corporations; Ohio Corporation Code.

MR. HOSFORD.

Trusts.

Their nature, creation, and elements; language and formalities necessary to the creation of a trust; resulting and constructive trusts; interests in trust property, and interests of trustees.

TEXT: Costigan's Cases.

MR. COUSE.

Municipal Corporations.

Nature, origin, and history; creation, control, and powers; corporate agencies, and officers; acquisition, holding, and alienation of property; liability for injury to person or property; revenue; indebtedness.

TEXT: Seasongood's Cases.

MR. CROWLEY.

Conflict of Laws.

A study of rules of private law pertaining to relations which contain foreign elements, with particular reference to jurisdiction of courts, foreign judgments, workman's compensation acts, contracts, mortgages, business organizations, and administration of estates.

TEXT: Humble's Cases.

MR. HOSFORD.

Senior Review Course.

On the completion of the advanced work in the Senior year, as a preparation for the bar examination, a review of all the branches of the law required by the Ohio Supreme Court for admission to the bar is undertaken by a member of our regular faculty who is a master in this field.

This is not a quiz course, but a comprehensive review requiring the examination of hundreds of recent decisions. This course is also offered in the first semester in preparation for the January examination.

MR. MECK JR.

The foregoing courses as outlined require four years of study in preparation for admission to the Ohio bar where the entire time of the student is not devoted to the study of legal subjects. For such students one year of study entails six lecture hours per week for a period of thirty-six weeks. The schedule is so arranged that each student is required to attend lectures from 6:00 p. m. to 9:00 p. m., either on Mondays and Thursdays, or on Tuesdays and Fridays. The student's application to his studies must be regular and attentive.

The foregoing courses, in preparation for admission to the Ohio bar, may be completed in three years of study where the student devotes his entire time to the study of legal subjects and attends lectures in the daytime. For such students one year of study entails twelve lecture hours per week for a period of thirty-six weeks.

The schedule calls for attendance upon lectures from 9:00 a. m. to 12 noon, afternoons being devoted to study and research.

The student's application to his studies must be regular and attentive. No classes will be organized or maintained with fewer than 15 students.

POST-GRADUATE COURSE OF STUDY

Lectures on Mondays and Thursdays from 6 p. m. to 8 p. m.

A law school course should not be confined to the study of the principles of substantive law. So far as possible a student should learn how to apply these principles to the more common problems encountered in active practice.

Although it is true that the details of practice can be mastered only after years of experience, yet it is the function of a well organized law school to lessen the gap existing between the law graduate and the successful practitioner.

To this end and in response to the demand from her alumni for an opportunity for further study, The John Marshall School of

Law submits a post-graduate course leading to the LL.M. degree. This course covers one year of intensive study under specialists in their respective fields.

The post-graduate course of study consists of five major subjects and ten minor subjects.

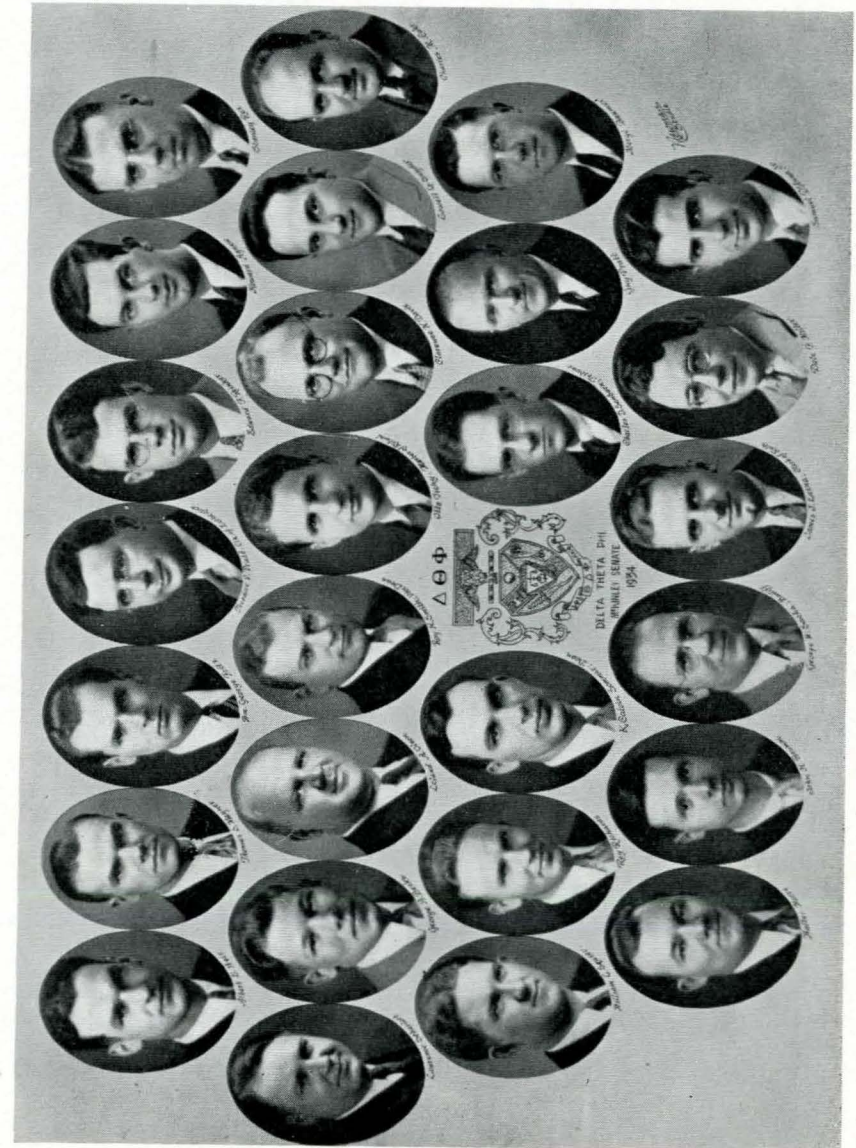
DELTA THETA PHI now has 60 active senates and 25 alumni senates located in all parts of the country with representatives at every leading university and law school.

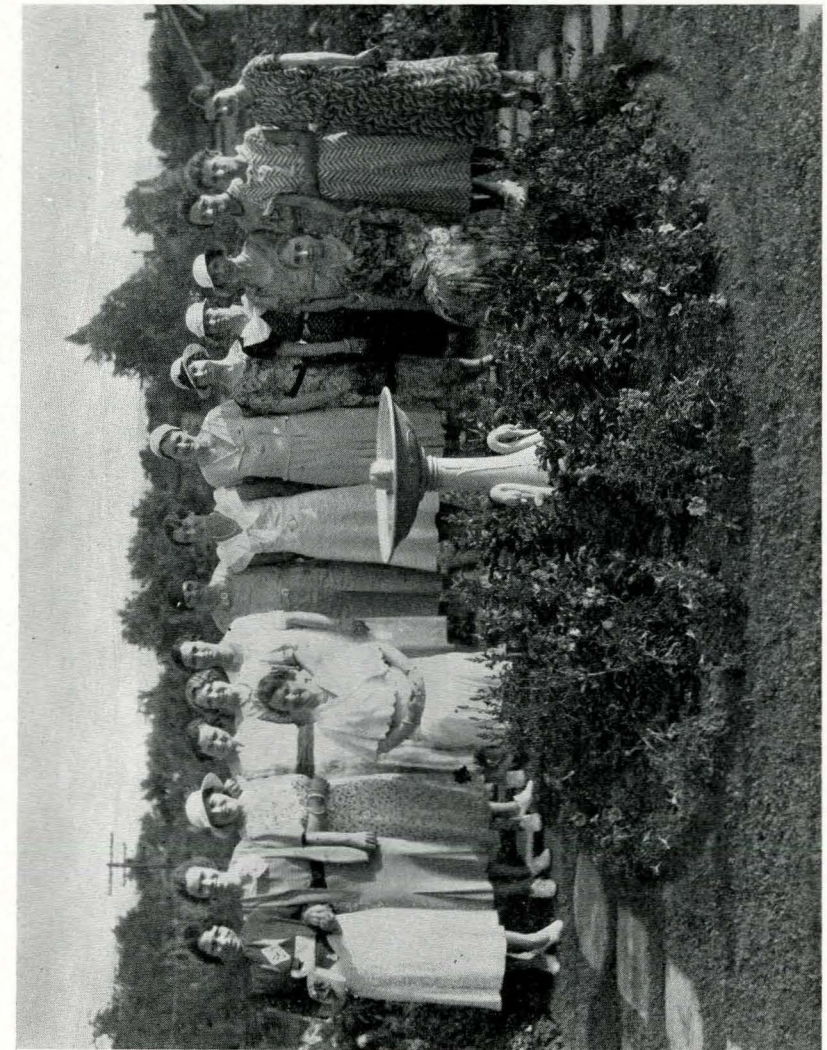
