Earliest Time for Sheppard Trial Will Be Mid-October

Mid-October is the earliest time Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard. 30, will go on trial for the bludgeon killing of his wife, Marilyn, and Common Pleas Judge Edward Blythin is the judge most likely to preside, it was learned yesterday.
