## Sheppard Has Spaghetti on 31st Birthday

Spaghetti and meatballs fea-tured the County Jail menu today as the jail's star boarder, Dr. Sam H. Sheppard, marked his

31st birthday.

There was no celebration of the event for the man who insists he is innocent of the Independ-ence Day killing of his wife,

Marilyn.

Deputy sheriffs reported that Dr. Sam kept his poise and did not seem disturbed over the lack of celebration of his birthday. He spent the day quietly in his fourth floor cell either reading,

napping or playing pinochle with

cellmates.

This contrasted grimly with Sam's 30th birthday last year climaxed by a small dinner party

in his home at 28924 W. Lake Rd., Bay Village, according to his oldest brother, Dr. Richard N.

Sheppard. "Sam never made much of his

birthday," recalled Dr. Richard, "but I do believe we all gathered at his house that evening. His birthday comes so close to Christmas that we generally combined the two." Dr. Richard said his memory was hazy of Sam's 30th birthday

but he recalled their parents, brothers and sisters-in-law went to Sam's home that evening.

Mrs. G. R. Brown, aunt of the
murdered wife, said:

"Sam was too busy as a rule for birthday celebrations. Because of the closeness of Christ-mas we always combined his

Christmas and birthday gifts."
Meanwhile, jurors who convicted Dr. Sam a week ago were

considering a joint statement explaining how they arrived at their verdict. William C. Lamb, juror No. 4, said confusion had been caused by a few jurors who de-

cided to violate an oath of silence.
