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Tuesday Afternoon Session, October 19, 1954.  
1:15 o'clock p.m.

MR. CORRIGAN: If the Court please, I have Mr. Hackethorn here of Station WHK with a recording of last night's debate, that I mentioned earlier today, and I wonder if I could put that in evidence now? ✓

THE COURT: You mean -- well, the Court will make the same ruling as to it as he made this morning. We are not going to go into these sideline issues now. We are engaged in trying to empanel a jury. I don't want to bar your rights in the matter. ✓

MR. CORRIGAN: I want to get it in the record, and the only reason I suggest it to your Honor now, I don't want to hold these fellows around here, and if I can get rid of that, why, it is in the record, and then it is for the consideration of the Court at some later time.

THE COURT: You want to put it in the record as part of the examination of these people?

MR. CORRIGAN: No. As part of the examination of Mr. Hackethorn on my motion. ✓

THE COURT: We don't want to stop now, Mr. Corrigan, to hear these matters. We will hear them

at the proper time, if you care to be heard. I don't want to bar you. ✓

MR. CORRIGAN: You will never know what it is unless you hear it, your Honor.

THE COURT: Of course not, and I don't want to hear it at the moment because we are engaged on another line of inquiry altogether, and when we get through with that, we will not close it until all your rights are protected.

MR. CORRIGAN: The only reason I suggest it now, they brought the machine down.

THE COURT: I don't want to hear it now, Mr. Corrigan. We will go ahead with this inquiry, and the subpoena may be considered valid until such time as the Court can hear the witness.

MR. CORRIGAN: Will you call the man in and tell him that, your Honor, so that he knows he is under subpoena?

(Mr. Hackethorn brought before the Court.)

THE COURT: Mr. Hackethorn, I understand you are under subpoena to appear here and to give some testimony or produce some records. The Court cannot hear you at this time, and you are pleased to understand that the subpoena is still valid and in force, and if you are needed we will call you later

at our convenience.

MR. CORRIGAN: We will telephone you,  
Mr. Hackethorn.

MR. HACKETHORN: All right.

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
