

Tuesday Afternoon Session, 1:30 p.m., October 25, 1966

THE COURT: Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen.

Ladies and gentlemen, before requesting the portion of the prospective panel that has not as yet been seated to return to your jury room, the Court wishes to commend you for your patience and your willingness to serve in this matter, and the Court wishes you to bear in mind that each of us who is participating, each person at the counsel table, the Court and those of us who are actively participating in this matter, realize that you also serve who patiently wait to be called.

I want to admonish you and instruct you again as a matter of law, that you shall not discuss this case, what you have heard of it, amongst yourselves. You shall not permit anyone else to discuss it with you, nor shall you permit yourselves to overhear anything that relates to this case by any means of communication.

Except for the first row here which has been seated, the Court will request Mr. Patrick to escort the rest of you from the room.

THE BAILIFF: Will you rise, please.
(Thereupon the prospective jury panel, except those

previously seated, were escorted from the courtroom.)

THEREUPON, YOLANDA COWAN, a member of the prospective jury panel, having previously been sworn, was examined and testified on voir dire, as follows:

THE COURT: Good afternoon,
Mrs. Cowan.

MRS. COWAN: Good afternoon.

THE COURT: Your name is pronounced Cowan?

MRS. COWAN: Cowan.

THE COURT: Mrs. Cowan, will you please keep your voice at a point where each one of us in the room can hear you.

You are going to be asked questions by the lawyers, and in your responses hold your voice at a point where each person in the room can hear you; will you do that, please?

MRS. COWAN: Yes, I will.

THE COURT: And remember, Mrs. Cowan, that you are under oath.
