of the jury, it is my understanding that some of you must attend church services, today being a Catholic holiday, some of you who have not yet attended Mass, or services, and also tonight will be your first night together at the Statler Hotel, and I want to give you time to get yourselves arranged and settled in your rooms, and also make necessary arrangements with the Court attaches, in whose care you will be, free to go to Mass, those of you who wish to go.

So we are going to adjourn at this time.

While you are away on your overnight adjournment,
ladies and gentlemen, you shall bear in mind
the instructions previously given to you, and that
is that you shall not discuss this case or what
little you know of it amongst yourselves.

You shall not permit anyone else to discuss it with you; nor shall you permit yourselves to overhear anything that relates to this case by any means or media of communication, radio, television, or any printed material.

Arrangements have been made at the hotel, ladies and gentlemen, so that you may make tele-

that will come into the hotel get to you under proper circumstances.

telephone calls that you will make, or that you receive, will first go to the court constable or the bailiff in whose care and custody you are, and that all the time you are on the telephone talking at home, to someone at home or elsewhere talking to you, that a member — one of the four that you met this afternoon — will also be on the phone monitoring your telephone conferences and telephone conversations.

further instructions that you feel that you need, you may inquire, and this will be relayed through the members of the constable's staff in whose care you are, to me, and we will proceed accordingly according to your needs and your desires under the supervision and the instructions of this Court.

We will now stand adjourned until 9:15 tomorrow morning.
