

THEREUPON, ROBERT J. STAMPLER, a member of the prospective jury panel, having been previously sworn, was further examined and testified on voir dire, as follows:

THE COURT: Mr. Stampler, you have in mind you are still under oath in this matter?

MR. STAMPLER: Yes, I know.

THE COURT: Mr. Stampler, do you have in mind the Court's previous instruction with respect to not discussing this case with anybody?

MR. STAMPLER: Yes, sir.

THE COURT: Have you discussed this case with anyone since you left the witness stand here just a few minutes ago?

MR. STAMPLER: Well, I was reading the paper, sir.

THE COURT: Now, you read the paper since you left?

MR. STAMPLER: I was reading the paper, sir.

THE COURT: All right. Now, the Court instructs you that you shall not discuss this case, or what little you have heard of it,

with anybody, including members of your family.

You shall not permit anyone else to discuss it with you. You shall not make any statement regarding any expressions or any opinions that you have with respect to the merits or the lack of merits in this case, on either side, do you understand that?

MR. STAMPLER: Yes, sir.

THE COURT: And you shall not discuss this case with anyone or make any statements about it, until such time as a jury in this room has returned its verdict in open court; do you understand that, Mr. Stampler?

MR. STAMPLER: I understand, I understand.

THE COURT: Thank you very much, and you are excused. Thank you for following the Court's instructions.
