

Thursday Morning Session, 9:15 a.m., October 27, 1966

(Thereupon the panel of prospective jurors was brought into the courtroom, whereupon the following proceedings were had:)

THE COURT: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen.

Ladies and gentlemen of the jury, the Court instructs you again before requesting you to go now to the room awaiting call as a prospective juror in this case, that you will not discuss this case or what little you know of it, even amongst yourselves.

You will not permit yourselves to overhear anything that relates to this cause. You shall not permit yourselves, or, you shall not read anything that relates to this cause and any type of publication.

You shall not permit yourselves to overhear anything that relates to it, by any means or media of communication.

Mr. Patrick now will escort you from the room.

(Thereupon the members of the prospective jury panel except those previously seated, were ex

escorted from the courtroom.)

THE COURT: Gentlemen, is the option with the State of Ohio?

MR. CORRIGAN: Yes, your Honor.

MR. SPELLACY: Yes.

THE COURT: Counsel Corrigan or Spellacy?

MR. SPELLACY: If it please the Court, the State will excuse juror number one, Miss Denk.

THE COURT: Miss Denk, before leaving, if you will, please, the Court wishes to thank you for the time that you have spent here offering your services in connection with this matter if called upon to serve as a juror.

Before excusing you, the Court instructs you and admonishes you that you will not discuss this case, even with a member of your family:

You will not permit yourself to be interviewed, you will not make any statements relative to this case with respect to its merits, on either side.

You will follow the instructions, Miss Denk, until such time as a jury, <sup>in</sup> this room has returned its verdict in <sup>open</sup> Court.

Do you understand those instructions?

MISS DENK: Yes.

THE COURT: If there is any doubt in your mind at any time with respect to them, or if anybody should wish to discuss this case with you, will you report that immediately to me?

MISS DENK: Yes.

THE COURT: Thank you very much. You are excused.

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
