

THE COURT: Ladies and gentlemen of the jury, you are going to be sent to your homes now; we are ready for adjournment, and while you are away on this adjournment, ladies and gentlemen, each of you shall bear in mind the instructions previously given to you, that you shall not discuss this case or what little you know of it, even amongst yourselves.

The first time, ladies and gentlemen, that you will be entitled to discuss this case even amongst yourselves is after you have heard all the evidence, after you have heard the lawyers' summation or arguments, and the Court's charge on the law, which you will apply to the facts as you and you alone find the facts to be.

Then and only then will occur the first time that you will be able to discuss this case amongst yourselves.

You will not permit anyone else to discuss this case with you. You will not permit yourselves to overhear anything that relates to this case by any means of media of communication, bearing in mind in detail the instructions given you previously with respect to printed material, radios, and newspapers, radios and television sets.

Now, ladies and gentlemen, tomorrow morning when you return to this building, bring with you sufficient personal requisites by way of clothing, by way of personal items that you will need, that you will need for your personal welfare, inasmuch as tomorrow night you will not be going home. You will be going to a hotel here in town where you will be held together under the instructions of this Court, with duly appointed constables who will attend to your needs and make your stay while you are gathered together as comfortable and as commodious as we possibly can.

So bring with you tomorrow morning when you come sufficient clothing and items of personal needs and welfare for several days, and if it develops that you have forgotten something or if it develops that there is something that you need along the line, there will be personnel of this Court who will be sworn to attend to you and to your needs while you are held together, to work out these things comfortably for you.

You will find that there will be instructions so that you will be under court rules and instructions, you will be permitted to have telephone conversations with members of your families,

under proper conditions, so that you may stay in touch with your families, your employers, and things of that sort. These will all be done under proper instructions and guidance of this Court, and you are now hereby excused from further consideration of this case this afternoon, but you are instructed to return here tomorrow morning ready for further service in connection with this case, at 9:15.

Court is adjourned.

(Thereupon the jury was excused from the courtroom, and the following proceedings were had in the absence of the jury:)

THE COURT: Let the record show that in the presence of prosecuting attorney John T. Corrigan, Counselor Lee Bailey, the Court is administering the oath to bailiffs in charge of the sworn jury, and for that purpose the Court has called Lawrence Patrick, his bailiff; Richard McDonnell, member of the staff of the Court of Common Pleas; Mary Grealis, member of the staff of the Court of Common Pleas; and Loretta Stanton, member of the staff of the Court of Common Pleas, all of our county.

Let the record show further that the Court has consulted with Counselor F. Lee Bailey,
